

Justice & Peace Europe Workshop, Valletta 10-11th November 2023 The Changing World of Work - A transversal justice issue

Work is an integral part of our identity. It is more than a way of making a living. It should help people foster their personal development, find their role in society and contribute to that common good which respects the world's social and environmental boundaries.

But what does all this mean in a world of work which is currently undergoing profound and radical changes? While some changes are country and industry specific, the paradigm shift is transnational and applies to almost every sector of the economy. Our understanding of work and of the relationships associated with it - between employer and employees and between employees themselves - is being dramatically upended by these rapid transformations.

How can we prevent the loss of structured work environments from becoming synonymous with lifelong precarious work? As jobs become more flexible, and the line between professional and private lives more blurred, how do we avoid the dangers of self-exploitation and work-related stress which comes from the need to be permanently available? In the case of jobs at the lower income scale, which in Europe are often occupied by third-country nationals, how do we avoid exploitative practices made worse by the advent of an under-regulated platform economy?

The **2023 Justice & Peace (Europe) International Workshop** will seek to explore these issues by helping participants learn more about the different ways in which the world of work is changing in Europe and explore the social and economic consequences of these rapid changes. Set in the historical setting of Valletta and the Great Harbour region, the meetings planned throughout the workshop will help shed light on the risk to workers' rights which are being magnified by the evolving nature of work, whilst also giving space to work practices which are respectful of the dignity and rights of workers.
